A Ray of Hope in Villa Central

KARELYN*, A 29-YEAR-OLD SINGLE MOTHER, carries the weight of the world on her shoulders in the humble community of Villa Central. Her days are a constant struggle to feed her four children: Three daughters, ages 12, 8, and 1, and one 4-year-old son. Worry and sadness have become permanent shadows on her face, especially when her youngest daughter cries from hunger.

During our January mission trip, team members visited Jaime Mota Hospital in Barahona, where they prayed and shared the word of God with patients and their families. The Holy Spirit guided the team toward Karelyn on their visitation rounds. Ricardo saw her sitting on

the side of a bed, her face filled with anguish, while her 1-year-old daughter slept, frail and delicate. "What's wrong with the child?" Ricardo asked. Karelyn replied, "She has too much sugar in her body." Ricardo, confused, asked, "Does she have diabetes?" Karelyn answered, "No," and with a voice barely audible and full of shame, she confessed the painful truth: "She has too much sugar in her body... it's because I give her sugar water in the morning, for breakfast, for lunch, and for dinner, because it's all I have to give her." Tears welled up in her eyes, displaying her grief and despair.

They prayed together at that moment, offering Karelyn's soul the hope that God was in control of her baby. Afterward, Ricardo asked for her phone number. However, Karelyn didn't have a cell phone, and the description of her home in Villa Central was so vague it would be almost impossible to locate. They parted with faith that their paths would cross again.

More than a month passed with no success in finding her. Ricardo didn't give up, but the community of Villa Central was large, and finding Karelyn was like looking for a needle in a haystack. Until one day, while Ricardo was assisting with a medical mission team in the same community, a young woman approached him and tapped him on the shoulder. "Hello, do you remember me?" she said. Ricardo's eyes widened with surprise and joy. It was Karelyn! "Of course, I do! I've been looking for you for over a month!" he exclaimed.

Young Adult Serves, Raises Support

CORINNE O'CONNOR HAD WANTED TO SERVE on an international mission team since reading "Kisses from Katie" in sixth grade. The book tells the story of Katie Davis Majors, who moved to Uganda after graduating high school. Katie had visited Uganda on a mission trip in her senior year. Today, Katie lives in Uganda and leads the ministry she founded that supports vulnerable families and children in that country.

Now in her senior year at West Virginia University (WVU), Corinne quickly signed up for a team serving with The Least of These Ministries when she learned of the opportunity at Suncrest United Methodist Church in Morgantown. She was part of the team from Suncrest that served during Thanksgiving week last November. The team poured several concrete floors in residents' homes and was able to support some roof repairs. Team members also participated in Bible School activities in a couple of communities and served with the Food Distribution.

Corinne had done volunteer work and completed service projects since middle school, but November's trip was her first international service experience. She was surprised at the living conditions of many in the communities where the team worked. Yet she witnessed that the families still were happy, many showing appreciation and giving glory to God for what they have.

"It's made me happier, more grateful, for what I have," Corinne said of her experience serving in the bateys. She said it also has helped her

to appreciate more the importance of community—friends & family—over material things. And she sensed God's presence, even amidst the difficult conditions.

Recognizing that much of the work being done in these communities comes with a financial cost, Corinne wanted to raise funds to help the ministry in this work. As a member of the **National Society of Collegiate Scholars (NSCS)**—she was recently elected to serve as President of the WVU Chapter—she embarked on a fundraising journey in conjunction with her Chapter of NSCS.

Through several fundraising activities, the organization raised almost \$400 for The Least of These Ministries! The funds were used to help cover expenses toward connecting electricity to the home built by the April Mission Team. This work will also help with the connection of future homes nearby, increasing the impact of the gift.



According to their website, "NSCS is an honors organization that recognizes and elevates high-achieving students. NSCS provides career and graduate school connections, leadership and service opportunities." The WVU Chapter is one of over 300 nationwide.

Ms. O'Connor, who is pursuing a degree in Finance, said she hopes to return to serve in the Dominican Republic one day. She also would love to serve somewhere in Africa in the future. We're confident that Corinne will share hope wherever God leads her!

"Two Paths diverged in a yellow wood and sorry I could not travel both..."; so begins Robert Frost's poem, "The Road Not Taken." Seven years ago I took a path to come on a mission trip to Barahona, Dominican Republic. So many things happened on that trip. I fell in love with a country. I learned so much about The Least of These Ministries. I fell in love with the people here. And with the youth I worked alongside on that trip and their leaders. I also fell in love with the founder of this ministry, Steve Hull. I'm so happy that I had the opportunity to do a mission trip with him.

After participating on several Mission Teams, I felt a strong call from God to stay a year in the country I fell in love with. I've now been here six months and God has proven over and over again that this

is where I needed to be.

To see the full working of Ministerio Cristiano Amor y Esperanza (how the ministry is known locally) has been an enormous blessing. I love that every week in every weather 14 bateys—plus other places—receive food. Many activities to build up the communities and their churches are also held in these bateys.

We have had mission teams come and again many lives were improved by their hard work and dedication. The next two Mission Team opportunities are scheduled in October and January. Information is below and on our website.

Throughout my ministry I have worked with different ages. What's wonderful about my time here is that I have the opportunity to work with all ages. I love babies, children, adults, and the 'wise adults.'

When I began my time here in January, I thought language was going to be a big barrier. At times it has been, but for the most part, no problema!

Facebook is an important tool for me. It keeps me in touch with my family and friends. I recently updated 'work experience' on my Facebook profile with 'Missionary.' Although I don't really consider this a job; it's a calling from God. Every morning and every night I thank God for the opportunity to be here and I ask God to watch over my family.

October 18–25, 2025

May include electrical/network wiring & plumbing.

Winter Mission Team
Service project: Depending on team size, we may work on 2nd floor of Ministry Hub and a service

January 10–17, 2026 project in a batey simultaneously.

Mission Teams will also include opportunities to serve with the daily food distribution ministry, children's activities, and evangelistic outreach!

Mission Team participation is \$725 plus airfare.

The small, bare kitchen with an empty refrigerator confirmed the painful reality Karelyn had shared. Ricardo didn't hesitate: he brought them food and clothes for her children, a small relief for the great burden they carried.

Today, Karelyn's story is a beacon of hope. Ricardo is coordinating with a community pastor to ensure that Karelyn and her family, and perhaps other families in the same situation, receive food regularly.
